In the October 2013 general conference Jeffrey R. Holland gave a talk entitled, "Like a Broken Vessel." If things continue to be debilitating, seek the advice of reputable people with certified training, professional skills and good values. Be honest with them about your history and your struggles. Prayerfully and responsibly consider the counsel they give and the solutions they prescribe. If you had appendicitis, God would expect you to seek a priesthood blessing and get the best medical care available. So too with emotional disorders. Our Father in Heaven expects us to use all of the marvelous gifts He has provided in this glorious dispensation." He later continued, "Whatever your struggle, my brothers and sisters-mental or emotional or physical or otherwise- do not vote against the preciousness of life by ending it! Trust in God. Hold on in His love. Know that one day the dawn will break brightly, and all the shadows of mortality will flee. Though we may feel we are 'broken like a vessel' as the Psalmist says, we must remember, that vessel is in the hands of the divine potter. Broken minds can be healed just the way broken bones and broken hearts are healed." If you are struggling from mental or emotional challenges, our hearts go out to you in love and compassion. As Elder Holland concluded, "may we live by faith, hold fast to hope, and show 'compassion one of another."

102. Sisters Perspectives on Adversity

Mary Fielding Smith, the widow of Hiram Smith stated: "I have, to be sure, been called to drink deep of the bitter cup; but you know...this makes the sweet sweeter." Ardeth Greene Kapp wrote: "How do we handle unfulfilled expectations?...We must accept the reality that this life is not intended to be free of struggle. In fact, it is through struggle that we are given opportunities to fulfill the very purpose of this mortal life. It is the fiery trials of mortality that will either consume us or refine us." Camilla Eyring Kimball was the wife of Spencer W. Kimball who faced a lifetime of trials and struggles, but who rose to greatness. She wrote these words of inspiration: "Forget self pity and look for mountains to climb. Everyone has problems. The challenge is to cope with those problems and get our full measure of joy from life." Finally, Joy F. Evans counseled us to look to the Anchor to overcome our trials and adversities: "It is true for all of us that the winds will blow and beat upon our houses. It is true, also, that our houses will stand if they are built upon the rock of Jesus Christ. Whatever adversity or difficulty we experience can be met with courage and faith, and even joy." Adversity and trials will be the lot of each of us in one way or another; may we meet them with courage, grace, dignity and unwavering faith, as we journey through this sacred experience of mortality.

In the painting Mary Fielding and her children are depicted on the long journey west, driving a team of oxen. On either side of the wagon are noted protecting angels, watching over Mary Fielding and her family along the way. It is reported that on one occasion during the journey, one of Mary Fielding's oxen became ill and unable to continue. Mary asked the elders to anoint her oxen but to no avail. Finally, through a prayer of faith her ox was healed and Mary Fielding Smith journeyed on safely to the Salt Lake valley. Just as Mary Fielding Smith was not alone, we are not alone in our time of need. In fact, we are never alone, but are sustained from breath to breath and day by day by our loving Heavenly Father. The only time that we know of someone being alone was the Savior as He brought to pass the infinite atonement, being left for a brief time by the Father in order for Him to truly overcome all things and to rescue us from sin and death. That starts a negative cycle that often continues with another person getting mad and also responding in a negative manner. When things are unfair we can respond in one of two ways. We can respond negatively as well and continue the downward cycle of anger or we can take the higher road and not respond in anger believing that eventually things will balance out. When life becomes unfair we can become angry, disillusioned or negative or we can press forward and stay focused on acting as we should. We need to realize that everyone makes mistakes, including our parents, and sometimes give them a little slack, realizing they are trying their best. 106. Though He Were a Son

107. Are You Having a Bad Day?

It seems that we all have a day in which everything goes wrong. We wake up on the wrong side of the bed, have a day or week of illness or failure at work or school. In those times it is easy to lose perspective and to feel that life will be forever a life of frustration. In those times we just need to look around us to see how blessed we really are. Look around at those who carry burdens for a lifetime. Many individuals who suffer severe brain injuries, strokes, or become paralyzed will bear those burdens through the rest of their lives. Kind caregivers provide a great service for those with extreme dementia, or severe birth defects that will require total care throughout their lives. Many years ago a friend was devastated when a daughter was born with a cleft palate. When she went to Primary Children's Hospital for the surgery, he felt crushed and defeated. After the surgery his daughter was placed in a ward with all kinds of people who would never get better. His daughter was better with a simple surgery, but those he saw would carry the burden for a lifetime. He went home saying, "I no longer had any problems." Maybe you are one of those who carries a lifetime of disability or illness. Our heart goes out to you, but even in those times know that the Savior will carry your burdens that they may be light. In the hard times count your blessings and not your trials.

108. They Who Carry No Cross Receive No Crown

A cherished ancestor, Hannah Peel, crossed the plains by handcart with the Martin handcart company. They faced many trials, and Hannah's husband John died close to Martin's Cove just before the rescue party arrived. As she was feeding her husband who was in the throes of death, he clenched and bit off his wife's thumb in the process just before he died. Hannah carried that cross with her for the rest of her life. She stayed strong in the gospel and would often share these words: "They who carry no cross receive no crown." There are crosses to bear of sorrow and grief, of illness and misfortune, of dashed dreams, and challenges to bear until we don't know how to carry on. The courage to walk forward in faith in the midst of adversity is a cross that we can carry through faith in our Savior, even Jesus the Christ. He bore His cross perfectly, thus He knows how to carry us as we bear our crosses which are much lighter than His. Let us always remember His invitation, "Come unto me all ye that labor and are heavy laden and I will give you rest." (Matthew 11:28)

The coldest I ever remember feeling was a fall morning moving sprinkler pipe. My shoes were worn out at the end of the season so I was moving pipe in my bare feet. 116. Facing Hard Times

Many of us face difficult circumstances at one time or another. Usually those trials pass, but sometimes they persist with us throughout our lives. The great ones have always faced trials. The apostle Paul was given 39 stripes or whipped 39 times. Once he was stoned, three times he was beaten with rods and three times shipwrecked. He remained true to the faith. The prophet Joseph Smith suffered from Typhus as a young boy, later was tarred and feathered, lost multiple children shortly after birth, spent six months in Liberty jail and was imprisoned on multiple other occasions, and finally sealed his testimony with his blood. Stillman Pond was one of the early members of the Quorum of the Seventy. Crossing the plains he lost nine children to malaria, complications of childbirth and so on, and also lost his wife. He did not quit or lose faith. He became one of the colonizers of the early pioneers. Reflecting on hard times one needs only to look at the perfect example of the Savior and the infinite suffering that He bore in the Garden of Gethsemane for you and for me. Whatever our trials may be, if we endure them well, they will eventually be consecrated for our gain.

117. Don't Give Up Your Free Agency!

I saw a man recently the other day who came in for treatment of a variety of symptoms. He made the remark that he had been trying to quit smoking for years but had been unable to do so. He stated that he no longer enjoyed smoking but he was addicted. Likewise, many suffer from the addictions of drugs, alcohol, pornography, gambling and a variety of other vices that leads to a loss of agency and to addiction. Of course there is always the healing power of the atonement, but for many individuals these addictions affect their ability to choose during the remainder of their lives due to the overpowering addictions which they have become involved with. When we are free from addictions we are free to choose to follow the path of progress. It has been said that we are free to make our choices but we are not free to choose the consequences of our choices, for they will follow according to natural and eternal laws. Before you ever take that first step to try drugs, alcohol, tobacco, pornography or any other addiction, ask yourself, "Where will this lead?" Satan would disguise many of these products which could addict us as being appealing, satisfying and fulfilling, but the opposite is true. These addictions will enslave us and lead us into a downward spiral of poor health, shattered relationships, and loss of the spirit that we each need so desperately in our lives. Hold onto your free agency of choice as the priceless gift that it is and you will be blessed all the days of your life.

118. Don't Be Too Hard on Yourself

Each of us falls down at times. It is part of life. When we do fail at a task or assignment Satan would have us become discouraged and give up. Too many of us are so critical of ourselves that we become our own worst enemy. Yes, sometimes we are too easy on ourselves and rationalize away our failures; but probably most of the time we beat ourselves up to the point that we don't want to go on. There is a balance to be found. Be hard enough on yourself to recognize what you need to do to improve, but easy enough to have the faith and determination to go on toward success. If you can listen to the spirit you will know how to find the proper balance and hasten the learning process, or know when it is time to go a different direction. Coaches who achieve excellence are usually demanding of their players, but also motivated to recognize and reward improvement. The balance in parenting is a delicate one. One thing to remember is that we cannot relate to everyone in the same way. Some respond better to one approach and another to almost the exact opposite teaching. Some people are visual learners, others learn by verbal or written instructions. When you find yourself getting down, don't be too hard on yourself. Get up and dust off your pants, then start over with a clearer vision and focus and eventually you will find success.

119. Hearts Were Hardened, Hearts Were Softened

At the end of the Book of Alma the observation was made that "Because of the exceedingly great length of the war between the Nephites and the Lamanites many had become hardened because of the exceedingly great length of the war; and many were softened because of their afflictions, insomuch that they did humble themselves before God, even in the depth of humility." (Alma 62:41). I have spoken with some of those who have been involved in war and hearts are indeed hardened or softened. In our day there are many who suffer illness or loss and through that time of trial we can go one of two directions: We can become teachable and humble, willing to submit to all things that we are called to pass through or we can become hardened and turn away from the Lord and weaken our faith. Oh, that we may be as Job and not let our integrity depart from us. His testimony echoes through the ages. "For I know that my redeemer liveth, and that he shall stand at the latter day upon the earth; and though after my skin worms destroy this body, yet in the flesh shall I see God." (Job 19:25-26).

As we look for balance in life it may appear that we are always on the negative side of the ledger, but there are many good and wonderful things in life. Are you OK if you turn off your electronic device for a day? **THE SIMPLE QUESTION IS, DO YOU CONTROL TECHNOLOGY OR DO YOU FIND IT CONTROLLING YOU?** Are you able to find the balance of some use on the internet to be used for uplifting purposes, but then use the rest of the day involved with those around you in personal interactions with them. We have great tools at our disposal, either for good or for evil. Let's use those tools as they were intended; for our good, for our growth, and happiness. Let us be careful that they do not become the end goal of all that we do.

123. Every Rose Has a Thorn

The experience is related of three passersby as they admired a wonderful rose. "Oh my," said the first, "It has a petal that is wilting." The second likewise stated, "It has a thorn that pricked me." The third, after looking at the rose, removed the wilting petal and clipped the small thorn and was left with a beautiful rose. It is said that beauty is in the eye of the beholder. Too often we see the negative detail in a beautiful arrangement or relationship. Focus on the negative blinds our eyes to the positive. If one listens to the news, very little of it is positive. If you don't want to be discouraged, don't listen to the news for six months. Even as we approach marriage, if we desire total perfection we will usually be disappointed. If we can learn to overlook some of the little faults in others perhaps they will be inclined to overlook our faults. If we stop focusing on the mote in others and focus on the beams in our own lives we will come to see things much more clearly as they really are. 133. Be of Good Cheer

As the Savior spent His last evening with his beloved apostles He told them to "Be of good cheer."
